

It's the final countdown: 2024 total solar eclipse preparation

Indiana last experienced a total solar eclipse in 1869, and the next one will occur in 2099. In preparation for the event, Governor Holcomb has issued Executive Order 24-05, Preparation for the Total Solar Eclipse of 2024.

As the total solar eclipse approaches, Governor Holcomb urges the public to understand the magnitude of the incoming crowd. The large crowds will significantly impact travel and emergency response. By now, all first responders should have clear plans for any potential emergency. The public is requested to cooperate and comply with instructions



to ensure everyone's munity and its guests. safety.

In the event of an emergency and potential resource strain, Governor Holcomb has a contingency plan. If he declares a disaster emergency, resources from another state will be called upon. This is a precautionary measure to ensure the safety and well-being of our com-


Governor Halcomb has declared statewide disaster emergency exits to ensure preparedness for the solar eclipse. The declaration is effective immediately and will terminate on April 9 at 11:59 p.m.

Solar Eclipse Viewing Safety

According to NASA, except during the brief

total phase of a total solar eclipse, when the moon completely blocks the Sun's bright face, it is not safe to look directly at the Sun without specialized eye protection for solar viewing. Only glasses with the ISO 12312-2 rating should be used and worn at all times (See "ECLIPSE" pg.

What you need to register to vote

•Have a valid Indiana Driver's License or Indiana State Identification Card.

•Be a citizen of the United States. Be at least 18 years old on or before the next general, municipal or special election. (A 17-year-old may register and vote in the primary election if the voter turns 18 on or before the next general or municipal election.)

•Have lived in your precinct for at least 30 days before the next general, municipal, or special election. Not currently imprisoned after being convicted of a crime.

efficient. safe, and growing! Meet Union County Transit. You may have noticed the friendly-looking vans and shuttles around town, but you'd be surprised how many people those vans have helped over the years. Think you wouldn't qualify for a ride, or couldn't afford one? You'd probaby be surprised about those answers, too! Some points to note about UC Transit: Service runs from the curb at your pickup point to the curb at your destination. The driver may assist you to and from the curb when boarding or leaving the bus,

but is not permitted to enter a residence or building. An escort or personal care attendant may accompany you at no charge. The driver is trained in passenger assistance and will secure all wheelchairs, help secure packages and assist with seatbelts if needed. With fares ranging from \$1 to \$6 per ride and specialty pricing available for trips, the prices cannot be beat in terms of transportation. 

1. Partial Eclipse -Glasses on

The eclipse begins when the moon partially blocks the Sun's disk. This partial eclipse phase can last over an hour.

2. Diamond ring -Glasses on

Shortly before totality, the crescent Sun converges into a single brilliant "diamond" of sunlight as the last bit of the Sun's bright disk shines along the moon's edge, while the first glimpses of the faint corona create a "ring" around the moon.

3. Baily's Beads -Glasses on

A crescent will grow on the opposite side of the Sun from where the diamond ring appeared at the beginning. This crescent is the Sun's lower atmosphere, beginning to peek out from behind the moon, and it is your signal to stop looking directly at the eclipse. Ensure you have safety glasses back on or are otherwise watching the eclipse through a safe, indirect method before the first flash of sunlight appears around the moon's edges.

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

prescription drugs which will be properly disposed of without threat to the environment. This program is for pill and liquid medications. Vaping pens without batteries and vaping cartridges will also be taken. Needles or sharps of any kind WILL NOT be accepted for disposal. This service is free and anonymous with no questions asked.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from BE ACCEPTED FOR

family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet.

In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines-flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash-pose both potential safety and health hazards.







RECOMMENDED IMPROVEMENTS UPDATES FOR US 35 INTERCHANGE

The recommended design for the I-70 and US 35 interchange is being updated as part of the Revive I-70 project. More robust improvements are now planned at the interchange. The modifications include a tight diamond interchange and two singlelane roundabouts. The updates will allow the existing loop ramps to be removed and eliminate weaving movements

ramps.

Initial recommendations at the interchange included only partial modifications to improve the acceleration and deceleration length of each ramp movement. The updated design is expected to better improve traffic flow and safety.


